
Mary could not understand English, so she didn't understand a word they said. But she could tell they were a very loving family. At last she understood that home is where love is. And the Robertsons were full of love.

Every Christian home must be modeled on the home of the Holy Family in Nazareth. Can you think of ways to make your home a more loving place for Jesus to live? Here's a family project that will help you identify both the loving and unloving things your family does.



Across the top of a large piece of paper, write the words HOME SWEET HOME. Make the letters big and bright. Divide your paper into two columns, a LOVING column and an UNLOVING column.

In the first column, list all the loving things your family does (play games together, help one another with chores, and so forth). In the second column, list all the unloving things your family does (for instance, arguing or being selfish). You can do your lists by drawing your

examples, by using pictures cut from magazines, or by explaining in writing.

As the week progresses, see if you can get rid of everything on the unloving side and add a whole lot of new things to the loving side. You can paste some of your loving pictures right over your unloving list.

Hang your HOME SWEET HOME paper where everyone, including Jesus, will see it. And remember to always give Jesus a home in your heart...where your love is.
